## Patient information

### Attending the Symptomatic Breast Clinic

#### **Breast Services**

# You can find the Breast Unit on the lower ground floor of the new Royal Liverpool Hospital.

- When you come to the unit, please report to the receptionist who will check your name and address and ask you if you have attended a breast clinic before.
- When you are called through from the waiting room, anybody who is with you will have to stay in the main waiting area because of lack of space and because patients are sitting in the clinical waiting area wearing hospital gowns. However, when your results are ready, you are welcome to bring another person in with you.
- As you will be asked to undress from the waist up you will find it easier if you wear separates rather than a dress.
- Because various tests are carried out, please allow at least the morning or the afternoon (depending on the time of your appointment) for these tests to be completed.

#### **Examinations and Tests**

You may be seen by one of our doctors or nurse practitioners first, or you may have a mammogram first.

## Depending on the details on your family doctor (GP) referral letter, you may need one or more of the following:

- Clinical Examination (Breast examination) A doctor or a nurse practitioner who are specialists in breast care may carry this out.
- Ultrasound (Breast scan)
   An ultrasound scan uses sound waves to produce an image of the breast. The scan is painless and only takes a few minutes.
- Mammogram (Breast X-ray)

This is done by pressing the breast between two special X-ray plates, which most women find uncomfortable, and a few will find it painful. If you do find it painful, this will only last as long as the compression (squashing), which only takes a few seconds.

#### • Fine needle aspiration biopsy

This involves removing cells or fluid from a lump using a fine needle and syringe. This is then looked at under a microscope.

#### Needle Biopsy

This is a simple procedure which will enable the doctor to obtain a larger amount of your breast tissue than a fine needle test. A needle is introduced into your breast to obtain the specimen. A local anaesthetic will be used for this test.

A nurse or radiographer will be with you when the doctor sees you. Following the examination, the doctor will tell you if you need any more tests. Most tests are carried out on your first visit to the Breast Unit.

#### What are the risks of having these tests?

These tests are very safe but can sometimes be uncomfortable. Having a needle test can cause the breast to become bruised and uncomfortable for a few days. Simple pain killers can help with this.

#### What happens if I refuse the tests?

It is your right to refuse a test, however a combination of these tests is the best way to get an accurate diagnosis. Refusing a test may make it difficult for the specialist to get an accurate result for you.

#### Are there any alternative investigations available?

The tests described above are the most appropriate and advanced that we have at the moment for investigating breast symptoms. Occasionally extra tests will be ordered as well.

#### Your results

If you have had a needle test we will try to give you the results on the day of your appointment. You will be asked to get dressed and return to the waiting area until your results are ready. The staff will let you know the waiting time. There is a tea bar on the ground floor.

Every effort is made to keep your waiting time to a minimum, but sometimes there are delays. The staff will let you know if there are any delays.

If we are unable to give you your results of your needle test on the day, you will be given a clinic appointment to return to the clinic within two weeks for the results.

#### Transport

Transport has not been arranged for this appointment so it will be necessary for you to make your own arrangements.

#### Feedback

Your feedback is important to us and helps us influence care in the future.

Following your discharge from hospital or attendance at your outpatient appointment you will receive a text asking if you would recommend our service to others. Please take the time to text back, you will not be charged for the text and can opt out at any point. Your co-operation is greatly appreciated.
