# Going Home after Breast Surgery with a Drain in place

It is quite normal after surgery to have one or two drains in place. This is to prevent the build-up of fluid around the wound. The drains are normally removed once the amount of fluid drained over a 24-hour period is 50 mls or the drain has been in place for seven days or otherwise specified.

#### Going home with a drain

Since many women feel so well after their operation, it has now become accepted practice in most hospitals for you to go home with your drain still in place. Before you are discharged, your nurse will give you full instructions about caring for your drain and will also check you are confident in looking after the drain.

#### Once you are home

The District Nurse will contact you the day after you are discharged. They will check if your wound is all right, and that you are able to care for the drain and record the drainage.

The District Nurse will let you know when they will call again to see you. They will leave a contact number in case any problems arise. The District Nurse will remove your drain once it has drained 50 mls or less in 24 hours or has been in place for seven days unless you are given alternative instructions by your Consultant.

#### Pain or discomfort

We recommend you take your prescribed painkillers for at least two days post operation. A simple painkiller, such as paracetamol will ease any pain you may experience.

Please remember that any pain would be the same whether you were in hospital or at home.

Please contact your family doctor (GP) or District Nurse if you have any severe pain or you are having problems with your wound or drain.

#### Caring for your drain

- Keep your drain well secured with tape, as instructed by your nurse
- Wash normally, but if you have a dressing on, avoid wetting the dressing
- Do not let the drainage bag drag, as this will pull on the drain and cause **pain**
- Measure and record the drainage on this form at the same time each day normally the first thing in the morning
- Check the suction is working as instructed by your nurse.

• If your drain comes out, please place a clean dressing over the wound and contact the ward where staff on duty will be able to advise you.

#### To empty and put suction back on

First check the amount that is in the bag.

- 1. Close inlet (top) clamp
- 2. Open outlet (bottom) clamp
- 3. Squeeze chamber
- 4. Close outlet (bottom) clamp
- 5. Open inlet (top) clamp
- 6. When emptying the outlet valve please clean with alcohol wipe
- 7. Ensure outlet valve is closed

Now measure what is in the bag. The difference between the two figures is today's drainage, e.g. if there was 200 ml in the bag and now there is 250 ml, today's drainage is 50 ml.
